Dear Friends of Moorlands

There has been a bit of a wildlife theme across school this week. KS1 thoroughly enjoyed their visit on Tuesday from Diane, who runs Prickly Pigs Hedgehog Rescue in Otley. She brought along one of her residents - Rhubarb - to meet the children, who asked some fantastic questions. This afternoon, KS1 are raising money to support Diane's work through selling biscuits and books . . . there will be photos and an update in next week's newsletter.



This weekend is the RSPB's Big Garden Birdwatch, which is the UK's biggest citizen science wildlife survey, this has been running since 1979. Reception have got off to a head start, making feeders and bird food cakes at home, which have been put into the EYFS Outdoor Learning area. They've then been out this afternoon - with 'eagle' eyes and check sheets - to see what they can spot. Also with an avian connection, Year 5 took part in an online science lesson about birds, which they thoroughly enjoyed.

If you have an hour to spare this weekend, why not take part? Last year, House Sparrows celebrated their 20th year as the number one bird spotted in UK gardens, but the decline in numbers since the survey started is staggering, with 22 million House Sparrows alone lost from UK skies since 1966. We are in the process of reviewing the provision that we have in place at Moorlands for both term time after-school clubs and during the school holidays. Yorkshire Water Trip

Year 5 and 6 visited Headingley Water Treatment Works on Wednesday afternoon, as part of their topic on Water.

First, we recapped on the water cycle and learnt how water enters the treatment centre (via local reservoirs and rivers). Next, we learnt about the various germs and bacteria found in water and the convoluted cleaning process to get rid of these.

The best part of the trip was donning our hard hats, headsets and hi-visibility jackets to be shown around the treatment centre itself. We saw how peat was separated from the water using lots of tiny brushes – it looked like a giant chocolate mousse!

Did you know 900 litres of water per second enters the treatment plant? Once treated, the centre produces 45 million litres of clean water every day for the people of Leeds.

Everyone agreed it was a very interesting visit; we all learnt something new.


























Hexapods


Long John Silver
